Those of you who have volume one of the 25 year Jubilee Album in your collection will have heard this line-up and maybe even SOME who can remember hearing them 'live' all those years ago! This will be your first ever chance, though, to hear them not in mono but stereo!!!

IF YOU believe in fate, then Chris Barber's career in jazz is surely a shining example of that mystic force.

His father played classical violin, and as a schoolboy Chris followed in his footsteps by studying the instrument, at Cambridge while he was at King Alfred School in Royston during wartime evacuation.

But the young Barber heard the earliest invasion of jazz on British 'wireless' and from that time he was hooked on the sounds of Harry James and Duke Ellington.

His pocket money was spent on 78 rpm gramophone records and by the time he had left school, Chris had a collection of more than 100 of the jazz greats.

"Each one cost five shillings (25 pence) each, which is about £2.50 in today's money, so it was quite valuable," he said. Because of his excellent mathematics at

Because of his excellent mathematics at school, Chris began training as an insurance actuary, but on one of his many visits to London's 100 Club, a hard-up member of a jazz band sold him a trombone for £6 10s 0d (£6.50).

Once he had learned the instrument, the first Chris Barber Band came into existence in 1949, on an amateur basis.

It became obvious that his interest in jazz was paramount, and after he had failed his exams, his father paid for him to attend a school of music, although later he found that he could have won a scholarship. May 1954 saw the formation of the Chris Barber Band which has been playing its way around the world ever since, including serveral appearances at the jazz mecca of New Orleans.

Never staying in one place for very long — "We get nervous after the second night" — the band has driven distances by road equal to three round trips to the moon since its formation.

"We treat the travelling as a part of the job, and probably don't enjoy it any more than the next man. But I happen to enjoy driving, which helps," Chris said.

He is particularly keen on the Newcastle Playhouse as a venue in the North East, and has already played there twice since its reopening.

Explaining the length of time that the Chris Barber Band has been in existence, and its popularity, he said: "We are constantly incorporating new sounds, styles and ideas into the programme so that we can keep the music fresh and interesting both for our fans, and ourselves."

"There are plenty of jazz bands around some playing 'traditional', some playing 'blues' — but we like to cover the whole spectrum of the music, and always try to get a depth of feeling into all the numbers.

"I have no idea which direction jazz will go in future years, if I knew I would be playing the music now!" said Chris.

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
